WORD DISTINCTION

The surface of the world, when compared with the sea, is called the **land**, but when compared with the sky or space it is called **earth** or the **Earth**: *After a week at sea, the sailors saw land*. *After a week in space, the spacecraft returned to earth*. An area considered as property is a piece of **land**: *the high price of land in London* The substance in which plants grow is the **soil** or **earth**: *a tub filled with soil/earth*, or (when we think of it as having an area) **ground** *a small piece of ground where I could plant a few potatoes* But when we are talking about large areas used for farming, we say **land**: *There is good land here for growing corn*. The surface we walk on is called the **ground**, but when this is inside a building, it is the floor: *The horse fell to the ground*. *The plate fell to the floor*.
